ne of my best friends died last week. Ojae and I met in 1994. We dated briefly but soon realized we were better as friends. That wasn't just a break up line - both of us really meant it. For the first decade of our friendship we lived in the same area. We loved to go to events together. We regularly went to plays, concerts, lectures, museums and dance performances. It was such fun to discuss our experiences of the event together afterward. We liked hiking together and wandering into bookstores and just hanging out. Ojae wasn't an enthusiastic cook, but she was a very appreciative eater of healthy foods. I loved having her over for dinner. She would usually come early and tell me all the news while I finished preparing the meal.

When I left to go to seminary, moving away from Ojae was one of my losses. It wasn't long

though before Ojae proved she was the kind of friend who was undeterred by distance. It helped that I've returned to New England at least once a year and it helped that Ojae liked to travel. She came to see me in Chicago more than once and visited me in St. Paul, MN when I was interning there. She visited me here in Kent several times. Some of you may remember her as she was one of the people who came to my ordination. Over this last decade my friendship with Ojae has continued to deepen and grow through our visits, letters and regular phone calls.

A few years ago Ojae was diagnosed with cancer. After a rigorous treatment of chemotherapy, radiation and surgery, her doctors declared her cancer free. Unfortunately, if that was ever true it didn't remain true for long. Last year, in November, Ojae was diagnosed with cancer once

again. She told me the news over breakfast in one of my favorite Northampton restaurants when we were visiting New England for Thanksgiving. This year, just before Thanksgiving I will go to her memorial service.

I share this with you because her death is on my heart and because Ojae is on my mind tonight as I think about grace. I've heard people talk about loved ones dying with grace. When they say that, I think they often are referring to a kind of open-hearted acceptance. I can't describe Ojae's dying in that way. But there was another way in which her life was infused with grace these last months. Even in the pain and the struggle, Ojae was fervently devoted to noticing and naming God's blessings in her life. Gifts of grace did not escape her attention, no matter how small. Each and every one she lifted up in praise and gratitude. The praising strengthened her and the gratitude carried her through many difficult moments. For Ojae, grace and gratitude were woven tightly together.

Grace is our theme for reflection at church this month. There is much to consider. I hope to see you in church.

"Paying What's Right, Not What's Left"

An Observation from LREDA Fall Conference

I have just returned from Decatur, Georgia, the site of this year's annual gathering of Unitarian Universalist professional religious educators. (LREDA is the acronym for Liberal Religious Educators Association.) It is always wonderful to spend a long weekend learning and networking with approximately 200 other

Directors of Religious Education from across the United States and Canada.

Our theme this year was "Best Practices for Shared Ministry". Some of the topics we considered were Staff Relations, Finance, Continuing Education and Pastoral Care. We heard from

several influential Unitarian Universalist leaders including Dr. Janice Marie Johnson, Multicultural Ministries and Leadership Director; the Reverend Sarah Lammert, Director of Ministry and Faith Development; the Reverend Richard Nugent, Church Staff Finances Director and Jessica York, Faith Development Director. It was an honor to be among such Unitarian Universalist luminaries.

I was particularly engaged in Reverend Nugent's presentation on church finances. He shared with us that one of their office's guiding principles is to "Pay What's Right, Not What's Left". This refers to how he and his staff encourage congregations to fairly compensate all of their staff with adequate pay, good benefits, a positive work environment and support for their professional development.

Before the conference, thirty experienced religious educators from various sized churches were invited to take part in one of three "compensation focus groups" in order for the UUA to gather information about the realities of compensation. I sat with 11 other DREs from mid-sized congregations while we shared our stories and

situations with Reverend Nugent. We all spoke candidly and honestly about our working

environments and how our churches are functioning as employers.

I discovered that the Unitarian
Universalist Church of Kent has
much to be proud of in this regard. I
was one of just a few DREs who is
fairly compensated in accordance with
the UUA's guidelines, receives access

to health insurance at the recommended rate and receives the suggested support for my professional development. While my colleagues were telling some sad tales, I was feeling very grateful, indeed!

Of course I look forward to the day when all professional religious leaders, including ministers, professional religious educators, administrators, support staff and musicians receive fair compensation and adequate benefits, but until that time, I am feeling blessed and supported by your good work.


Get Smart on Organizing

Art and Allah Symposium featuring Persian Poetry: The Gate to Islamic Mysticism

The Library committee is grateful to the congregation and to friends of the congregation for their support of the first two Symposiums, "Art and Allah." The 3rd and final Symposium will be held



on Monday, November 17th at 7:00 pm in the Sanctuary and will feature Mohammad Ja'far Mahallati, Presidential Scholar in Islamic Studies at Oberlin College. Professor Mahallati will speak on "Persian Poetry: The Gate to Islamic Mysticism." He will discuss a few works from classical Persian poetry, including the Sufi poet, Rumi, each conveying an important concept in the Islamic worldview.

After studying Islamic theology at Khan Seminary in Shiraz, Iran and receiving his Ph.D. in Islamic Studies from McGill University, Mahallati began working on his book, *The Return of a Civilization:* Reflections on the Contemporary Iranian-Shii Thoughts on War and Peace. In addition to his religious studies, Mahallati enjoys pursuing his interests in Islamic art and literature, specifically Sufi poetry and sacred calligraphy.

Professor Mahallati will answer questions at the end of his presentation, followed by refreshments in Fessenden Hall. This is a special opportunity to learn about Islamic culture through poetry. We look forward to seeing you there.




The Wisdom Path


Please appear at our first get-together on Wednesday, November 5th. We will have fun doing this together.

The Art of Hearing Heartbeats

The Patricia Pownall UU Book Group will be meeting on Tuesday, November 11 at 7 pm in the home of Bonnie Harper. This month we are reading *The Art of Hearing Heartbeats* by Jan-Philipp Sendker.

A poignant and inspirational love story set in Burma, *The Art of Hearing Heartbeats* spans the decades between the 1950s and the present. When a



successful New York lawyer suddenly disappears without a trace, neither his wife nor his daughter Julia has any idea where he might be...until they find a love letter he wrote many years ago, to a Burmese woman they have never heard of. Intent on solving the mystery and coming to terms with her father's past, Julia decides to travel to the village where the woman lived. There she uncovers a tale of unimaginable hardship, resilience, and passion that will reaffirm the reader's belief in the power of love to move mountains.
