This is such an exciting time in our church! Just about every Sunday I hear exclamations of delight as people see yet another piece of our renovation completed. The enthusiasm is palpable. And the excitement that comes from seeing well designed and well executed projects come to fruition is contagious. It is kind of like dominoes – one good idea made manifest leads to another. As a body we have so many good ideas about how we can make our church more beautiful, more welcoming, more vibrant and full of life. Not only that, we are lucky to have so many talented and hard working people who are eager to help put all these good ideas into practice. This is a generative time for us.

It is also a reflective time. Throughout our shared ministry we are endeavoring to find better ways to fulfill our reason for being church. We are exploring not only how we are with and for each other, but also how we are reaching out to be an agent for peace and justice in the world beyond our walls. Action and reflection follow each other as we experiment. Some of the areas we have been exploring this fall include:

Small Group Ministry -

Small Group Ministry (SGM) will provide opportunities for the members and friends of this church to know and be known, to engage, support, and nurture each other, to grow our souls, to wrestle with questions that matter with people who care and to encourage us as we bring our faith into the world. The SGM steering committee has formed and is working to plan a pilot program for this spring. Changing the times of our worship services -

For now, we have decided not to make a change. As you may know, we have experienced a big decline in attendance in our children's religious education program this fall. The more we talked with people about the possibility of changing the times of our services, the more we realized that we could not do so without also making a change in our children's religious education program. We now think it best not to make a change that will impact children's religious education until we have more information from families about the reasons they do and do not choose to bring their children to church. Over the course of the next few months, we are going to be gathering information from families involved with the program. We will then use that information to reflect on whether we ought to make any changes in our children's religious education programming. At that point, we will also reconsider the possibility of changing our worship service times to reduce overcrowding in our earlier service.



Renewing our covenant -

Most literally, to covenant means to come together by making a promise. What do we promise when we choose to become members of this church community? It is an important question and our answers have great significance. The more insight we can have into our reason for being church, the more clarity we will have about *how* to be church. The Committee on Ministry will be supporting a series of covenantal conversations. The first will take place this winter. Please see inside this issue of the newsletter for more information and an invitation to participate.

This is an exciting time in the Unitarian Universalist Church of Kent. I am glad to be here with you now. And I look forward to the tomorrow that we are creating together.

December 7th Congregational Meeting Highlights

The meeting opened with Reverend Melissa Ziemer announcing a growing concern about the imbalance in the attendance levels at the two Sunday worship services. As attendance has been regularly tracked since fall, a consistent trend has been documented reflecting the fact that about three times as many people attend the first service as the second. It was noted that newcomers to the first service may feel uncomfortable when they arrive and the pews are filled to near capacity. A discussion took place regarding thoughts on changing the times of the Sunday services. More discussion on this topic will take place in the future.

Susan Goekler invited comments regarding the church's new organizational structure and the by-law changes approved in May 2005. A topic that generated considerable discussion involved establishing a policy regarding the adoption of church Resolutions. A suggestion was made to incorporate a by-law change that would require a "super majority" consisting of 80% affirmative votes in order for the congregation to approve a Resolution. The present by-laws are silent on this issue. The Social Justice Committee is planning to analyze the issue in more detail. By-Laws Committee members Susan Goekler and Christie Anderson encourage members to submit to them thoughts regarding the church's by-laws and organizational structure.

Vivien Sandlund, Chair of the Social Justice Committee summarized the many activities undertaken in recent months by the Committee. She explained that the Committee is working on a proposed Resolution regarding the use of torture. Mac Goekler announced that his Chalice Lighter grant application to the OMD district office has been approved. Funds received through the Chalice Lighter calling will be used to renovate the interior of the Eldredge Annex to make the space more usable for larger groups.

The meeting's important business topic was the proposed 2006 church budget (see next page). Beth Wills highlighted budget features and reported that the Budget Committee succeeded in working toward bringing the compensation for the staff more into line with UUA fair and just compensation standards. The budget also includes a new Sexton position. The budget was approved by the congregation and appears below. Questions about the budget should be directed to Beth Wills, Board Trustee for Finance.

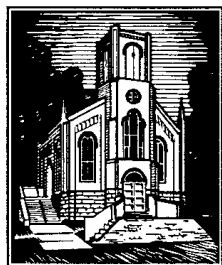
