In a world plagued by war, degradation, indifference and despair, the call to be justice centered is life-affirming and filled with hope. This mission inspires and challenges me – it calls out my Yes!

The statements we create to describe who we are, why we exist in the world (mission), what we dream (vision) and how we will be together as we aspire to live out our calling (covenant) are vitally important. This year at church you will be invited to spend some time reviewing the statements we have inherited as a church and considering whether they are in need of any revision. The details of the process will be shared later this fall. Between now and then, I invite you to notice what about your experience with this church captures your attention, inspires and challenges you and calls out your Yes!


The whole extended family is invited to gather together for our annual Ingathering service. Bring a small sample of water and soil from a place that has been important to you this summer to share in our celebration.

Our annual canvass provides us with an opportunity to dedicate our financial resources to the fulfillment of our ministry. This is a good time to take a look at the shape and scope of the ministry we share today and dream together about our ministry for tomorrow.

## Message from the Moderator

What is a moderator? In other churches I might be called the church president. I collaborate with the wonderful team of people, all volunteers, who make up the Board. With input from members of the congregation, our Minister, the Staff and the Board, I plan the agenda for Board and Congregational meetings. One of my responsibilities is ensuring faithful compliance with our By-Laws in all operations of the Congregation, Board and Committees. Another aspect of my role is to inspire our Board and Congregation to fulfill their dreams for our Church.

The Board has recently clarified our goals for the year: We intend to work to help create a *culture of welcome*. We are visioning a total membership of 200 people by May 2007. We see ourselves becoming a welcoming congregation for children with attendance at RE growing to 60 or more. We dedicate ourselves to being a Board focused on mission, vision and policy; increasing our delegation skills and empowering committees to do their work with creativity.

The UUA encourages congregations to be proactive in developing safety policies for children and adults. We already have a child safety policy so the Board and Minister recently asked the Committee on Ministry to develop an adult safety policy. They titled it The Policy Regarding Disruptive Behavior. The Board has adopted the policy with minor changes. We are recommending that language be added to the By-Laws to reference this policy. There will be an opportunity for discussion at the next Con-

gregational meeting 9/20. The amended language will be voted on at the December Congregational meeting. A copy of the policy is attached to the August minutes. We wish to clarify that this is not a behavioral covenant which would of course require extended congregational involvement.
