My partner's family did freeze when she was young, so I appointed her navigator. We got books, purchased a freezer, bought a canning kettle and began. When we get stuck we call her parents or consult the internet. When we get tired of standing on our feet for all the sorting and washing and cutting and peeling and blanching and rinsing we remember why this matters.

Throughout the winter and into the spring we will eat the riches of summer, sustainably grown and harvested, by our own hands and by the hands of the people in our community. We will reduce our impact on the earth, requiring fewer fossil fuels with each and every meal. We will save some money but more importantly, we will nurture our bodies and our spirits with food we know we can feel good about.

This whole process has been a revelation for me. It has taken a lot of time, more time than I anticipated. But as I watch the contents in the freezer rise and the shelves of the basement fill with dilled beans and rich tomato sauce, I know that I am abundantly blessed.

However the harvest is coming to its fullness in your own lives, may it be a blessing.

## Moderator's Message

On August 22 the Board held an evening retreat at the old jailhouse in Kent. Our focus for the retreat was "becoming a visioning Board." This theme seemed appropriate to me for several reasons: 1) results of a systems inventory completed by Board members last Spring indicated that on a continuum between practicalities and vision our work has been heavily weighted towards the former; 2) 3-4 hour Board meetings had become the norm at our church; and 3) in May, the congregation approved new statements of mission and vision.

Facilitators for the Board retreat were Rev. Kathleen Rolenz, co-minister of the West Shore Unitarian-Universalist Church and Ms. Karen Kircher, immediate past-president of the West Shore UU Church Board. They shared with us their church's journey through the transition from a managerial to a policy model of governance. They conveyed to us that Boards can't do it all; we can't be the managers and vision casters at the same time. They emphasized that true "Board work" includes tasks such as stewardship of the mission and vision of the church, defining and monitoring how the Board governs itself, maintenance of the financial integrity of the church, and creation of policies that define the roles of volunteer and professional "staff". They recommended that in order to undertake this work, the Board must learn to delegate authority appropriately. They helped us envision possibilities for a

new model of UUCK Board functioning that has the potential to make Board membership more appealing to more congregants.

Based on what we learned from our retreat facilitators, the Board has established the following goals for the 2008-09 church year:

- Reduce minutiae at Board meetings
- Clarify lines of responsibility and authority (Board, Minister, councils, committees)
- Study policy governance (books, videos, consultant, Wooster exec team)
- Study size transitions (pastoral to programming)

These goals, along with a focus on mission and vision, will guide my work in establishing Board meeting agendas throughout this church year.

If you want to see your Board in action, please know that Board meetings are open to the public. We meet on the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the Annex. If you would like some time to address the Board, please notify me at least one week in advance. Board meeting minutes are available in a binder in the Founders Lounge. Church policies are available in the copy/mail room of the Annex.

## A New Year for Religious Education

What a wonderful start to the 2008 – 2009 children and youth religious education year. Please remember the following:

- Nursery is offered for infants, toddlers and children up to 3 years of age. *Children over 3 years old are not permitted in the nursery.*
- Children and youth 3<sup>rd</sup> grade and up participate in the worship service EVERY Sunday for the first 15 minutes. Please have your children join you in the sanctuary for time to worship together.
- All RE classes run 15 minutes past the worship hour.
- Spirit Play class (4yrs – 2<sup>nd</sup> grade) meets at 9:30am. *Children go directly to class.*
- Holidays and Holy Days group (3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, and 5<sup>th</sup> grades) meets during the first service 9:30am – 10:45 *Children worship with families first 15 minutes of service and then go to class.*
- Neighboring Faiths group (middle school) meets during the second service 11:15 – 12:30. *Youth worship with families first 15 minutes of service and then go to class.*
- High School class meets during second service 11:15 – 12:30. *Youth worship with families first 15 minutes of service and then go to class.*

Have you completed your GREEN FORM? All children and youth participating in RE and nursery need to have a Registration form completed. See classroom teachers or the DRE for a form!

Thank you to the families, individuals, children and youth who participate and give support to the ministry involving religious education the children and youth. They are an amazing group.

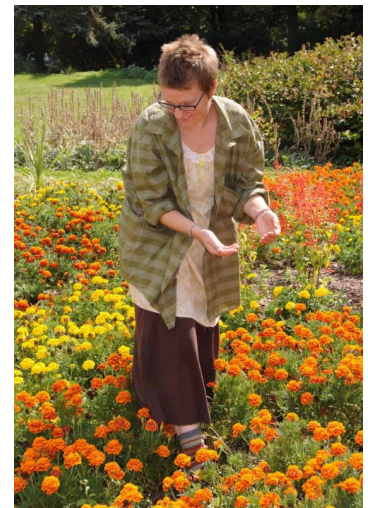
## Domestic Violence Awareness

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Rev. Carvill-Ziemer and I will have a service on October 19th that address this topic and honors those who have suffered violence in their lives. You will have an opportunity to participate as well by taking part in The Clothesline Project. According to [clotheslineproject.org](http://clotheslineproject.org), "The Clothesline Project is a visual display of shirts with graphic messages and illustrations that have been designed by women survivors of violence or by someone who loves a woman who has been killed. The purpose of the Project is to increase awareness of the impact of violence against women, to celebrate a woman's strength to survive and to provide another avenue for her to courageously break the silence that often surrounds her experience." On 9/28, 10/5, and 10/12 there will be a table in Fessenden Hall where you will be able to create a shirt (on paper) to honor someone in your life that has been affected by violence of any kind. There will be instructions and supplies provided at the table. Please consider participating in this important and powerful project that will later become a part of the October 19th service.

The Church Library has recently purchased a book of interest. So Help Me God: The Founding Fathers and the First Great Battle Over Church and State is by Forrest Church. Church is minister of All Souls Unitarian-Universalist Church in New York City and a well-known author and figure in our church.

Today's dispute over the line between church and state is neither the first nor the fiercest in our history. In a powerful retelling of the birth of the American body politic, Church describes our first great culture war—a tumultuous yet nearly forgotten conflict that raged from George Washington's presidency to James Monroe's.

The YTD numbers for July that appeared in the September Newsletter were the same as those for June in the August Newsletter. Obviously this is in error. Sorry about that. The corrected July YTD numbers are above. Accounting numbers and Board reports are correct. I just copied the numbers incorrectly late at night for the Newsletter.

We continued to do well vs. our monthly plan in August. Revenues were slightly above plan, and Expenditures slightly below plan. Year-to-date we are significantly above plan, and we did not have to use any cash reserves in August. The monthly plan indicated we might have to use over \$5000 of cash reserves in August.

In September, based on our historical 'summer slump', we planned a significant increase in pledge income as people return. If this happens, we will continue to do well compared to plan.

The pledging process going on now is not only an opportunity for you to share your plans for contributions during January through June of 2009 with us, so we can complete 2009 financial plans for the church. It is also an opportunity for you to update us on changes in your status, address, phone number or email. We can handle any set of giving and communicating arrangements, but we want to

know how you want the church to list your name[s] in Contribution Reports, and which phone and email you want the church to use to communicate with you. If your arrangements change and you want a different name on your Contribution Report, or separate Contribution Reports, this is not a problem; just send me an email or a letter addressed to the church stating the date of the effective change and we will update the information and provide Contribution Reports in accordance with your wishes. We want to respect your wishes for how you want the church to address and communicate with you.

Some Children and Youth are making contributions in the envelopes provided in the pews. They will get their own Contribution Reports. We think this is great! Keep it up, kids.

Contact me any time you have questions on church financial matters, or on the Contribution Reports you will be getting next month.

Thanks again for your financial support of the church, and for keeping us on plan for the year.

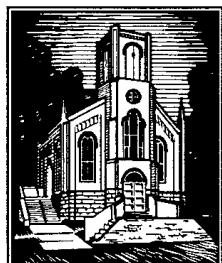
### Sermons and Minutes Available
