ransparent: n. manifest; obvious; open; frank; candid. One of the most important goals of any board, in my opinion, should be to make sure the people they serve know what they are doing. Our board vehemently agrees with this opinion as well. We are an open board. Any member of the congregation is welcome at any meeting and our minutes are posted at two places in the church: one set in the Annex and another in the Founder's Lounge. However, I know that many folks don't always look at the minutes. I would like to take this opportunity to share with you some of the highlights of the last few board meetings.

Since it's quite obvious that parking is always an issue for us, we have spent a lot of time discussing the leasing of the city lot behind us. Thanks to the hard work of the Master Plan Committee, we now have an official contract to sub-lease the lot. We also have letters of agreement from the Kent Trustees next door and from Child and Family Services across the street. These documents allow us to be covered by our insurance for those locations.

We also created a policy on the disposal of alcoholic beverages after events where alcohol is served. We felt it was an important safety issue with regard to children in the building. The full policy will be posted on the refrigerator so that everyone is aware of it.

Another safety issue that recently came up was the fact that we needed glass in the RE classroom doors. Ed Stolish and Karen Lapidus took care of finding someone to handle the fitting of the glass, and now the doors look great.

The board also reviewed the Strategic Plan to see if we were on track in those areas that are the responsibility of

the board or trustees. We were pleased to find that we are right on target for just about everything. Our biggest goal is to move into Policy Governance, and we have found that we need to move slowly to make sure that we are creating the right kind of governance structure for our church. We hope to have a proposal ready for the annual meeting, and we will have a discussion about it at the informational meeting in June (and perhaps before as well).

As you are most likely aware, we had a discussion of our relationship to outside for-profit companies. Based on the discussion we had as a congregation, the board put together a list of concerns for the new ad hoc committee that will look into this issue and create a church-wide policy regarding it. This committee has been formed and will begin their work soon.

At our last meeting, we discussed the need for members who are going to District Assembly to serve as voting delegates. We have slots for seven delegates, plus Melissa. There are a few members of the board willing to serve, but we still have need of others. If you are going and would like to be a delegate, please let me or Melissa know as soon as possible.

These are just a few of the issues that have recently come before the board. We are going to start posting the minutes in Fessenden beginning this month. I will post the agendas there as well. We want our work to be known so that if there are questions or concerns, the congregation can come to any of us to discuss them. We hope that are efforts of transparency are obvious. We are here to serve your needs, and we want you to know what we are doing. In service, *Lori*

Doing Multigenerational Ministry Well

You may consider it a matter of course and not something you recognize or celebrate, but from my point of view, as the returning Director of Religious Education, our church has many reasons to be proud of our multigenerational way of "doing church". We do multigenerational ministry amazingly well.

Many of our programs that involve folks of all ages come directly from the Religious Education Committee. For example, the Surprise Friends program (see the blurb elsewhere in this newsletter for dates and details) and the Sunday morning program with its core of approximately 24 adults who work with our children and youth.

The Coming of Age program, implemented by a forward-thinking task force last summer, intentionally pairs youth with adult mentors who are not their parents nor the parents of their peers, so that true intergenerational engagement will take place.

Our social activities team has hosted a game night and an amazing Valentine's Day Dance. Both events drew folks of all ages, offering them opportunities to share fellowship, to have fun together and to grow in community.

Certainly, our Hogwarts Action Team creates a time and space for young children, youth and adults to share some Unitarian Universalist magic! Over the years, the Hogwarts program has created ways for the maturing children to move into leadership roles. This attitude of leadership development is an identified characteristic of a healthy multigenerational community.

The Walden programs are multigenerational, too and many children have grown up attending these events over the years. Our Green Sanctuary project is and will continue to be shaped and implemented by folks of all ages. You probably have noticed that there are youth who regularly sing in the choir.

The Worship Associates who collaborate with Melissa and me to create our multigenerational worship experiences seem to have an understanding of what this concept means and what elements it requires. It has been such a pleasure for me to step into this worship planning experience.


I hope that naming these areas where we excel illustrates our strong multigenerational ministry.

Dinner honors Kent Environmental Council

The Social Justice Committee will be sponsoring a dinner and program on Saturday, March 13 on the 40th anniversary of the founding of the Kent Environmental Council, which began meeting in Fessenden Hall of our church. KEC was largely founded as a result of the fire in Cleveland on the Cuyahoga River, which runs through Kent as well as many northeast Ohio communities. The program will focus on our church's pivotal role in the founding of the environmental movement in Kent and its early focus on water pollution. At the time, the Cuyahoga River was extremely polluted and dirty and the Cleveland fire drew national attention to environmental issues that eventually gave rise to the very first Earth Day, which was celebrated on April 22nd, 1970. Many current and former members of our church participated in a river clean-up that day, which resulted in the creation of Franklin Mills Riveredge Park and Brady's Leap Park. The dinner will begin at 6:00 p.m. with the program to follow. The cost of the dinner will be a free-will offering. Child care will be available.

Financial Corner

he overall financial situation for the year improved in January. Year-to-date expenses are still about \$6500 below plan, and donations are now about \$7000 below plan, meaning that we are close to break-even. If the year-end revenues and expenditures are below plan by the same amount, we will meet our budget. Keep in mind this will means we will have only \$3288 in the bank on June 30, a very small amount compared to the over \$17000 monthly expenses.

It looks like we will meet our budget if people continue to donate as they have been and we keep our expenses below plan. Thus there is no need to revise the budget at this time. That's very good news! I will continue to monitor the situation, and engage the Finance Committee if it looks like a budget revision is needed because we may run out of money. But for now we are OK.

During the past year, the MASTER PLAN COMMITTEE pulled together plans for the next 5 years, approved by the congregation last May, that will make progress toward our Mission and Vision. Committee Chairs and the Board reviewed these specific plans on February 3. In FY2011, we plan to implement some things that were

planned in FY2010. And we feel the mandates to pay our staff fairly, not overwork volunteers, and keep our wonderful old building running well.

The "FY 2011 Guide to Our Annual Stewardship Campaign" is now available for the 2011 fiscal year going from July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011. Nearly all [\$208,804 out of \$244,413] of our revenues are planned to come from your pledged donations. The stewardship campaign enables us to match the church's plans for FY2011 with each of your personal giving plans for the same period. Hopefully after hearing about the church's plans, your personal giving plans [pledges] will align with these, and we will be able to do these great things in the coming year. Our planning goes on in April, after the stewardship campaign ends. We will do all we can to accomplish the church's plans once we know your plans as stated on your pledge card.

Contribution Report Confusion?

The accounting package we use treats each fiscal year as a separate Fund, and subtotals your contribution for each Fund. The Report that it generates includes contributions to each Fund for the calendar year 2009. FY2009 started 1/1/2009 and went through 6/30/2009. In the Report, contributions for FY2009 are listed as "2009 General Fund Donations 9000", since these contributions went into the FY2009 General Fund, or the budgeted operation of the church. We are now in FY2010, which began 7/1/2009 and goes through 6/30/2010. Since the Contribution Report covers all of calendar 2009, it will show any prepays you made prior to July 1, as well as your contributions during calendar 2009 under "2010 General Fund Donations 9000".

If your pledge card was checked to donate quarterly or more often, the amount you pledged during all of calendar 2009, through 12/31/2009, is shown for each Fund. If you checked that you plan to contribute annually, the total pledge for FY2010 will be shown. If you want your Contribution Reports for FY2011, which begins 7/1/2010, to show the amount you pledged SO FAR during the year, please check the box for quarterly or more frequent payments. Contact Bob Erdman if you want to make any changes to your FY2010 pledge, including the frequency; he will be happy to update the pledge record, or answer any questions.

Past Church Member Nan Abdo

This past December, Nan Withington, a member of this church from 1965-85 (whom we knew as Nan Abdo) took part in the Gaza Freedom March, trying to break the siege imprisoning the 1.5 million Palestinians who live in Gaza.

While working on her MA in Middle East studies at Berkeley in the 1950s, Nan met and married a Palestinian refugee, Mathar Abdo, whose family had been expelled from Jaffa in 1948. In 1968, on a research trip, she visited the new wave of displaced Palestinians in refugee camps in Jordan.

The family settled in Kent and joined this church during the tenure of the Rev. Peter Richardson; Nan sang in the choir, taught Sunday school and was on the Board of Trustees when the church voted to stop paying the telephone tax as a protest against the Vietnam war. Her four children grew up in the church, and are now scattered: Janan lives in Portand, Oregon; Nadia lives in the Orkney Islands, Scotland; Jim is in Wash. D.C.; David in Charleston, S.C. Nan herself now lives in Santa Barbara, California and can be contacted at nwithington@yahoo.com.

Local History Program at Church

ayne Enders, Portage County Historian, will appear at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Kent on Wednesday, March 31, at 7:00 pm to present a program on the news, significant events, and important people of Kent and Portage County, during the years from 1900 through 1930. Enders, lifelong resident of Ravenna Township, is the author of Connecticut Western Reserve, State of Ohio, County of Portage Timeline 1669-2007.

Three major events highlighted this period that have had a lasting impact on Kent some 100 years later. First, Kent was selected in 1910 as the site of a new Normal School by Ohio Governor Harmon, provided the city met all the conditions. The story of how this was accomplished is both entertaining and filled with political maneuvering. Next, the great flood of 1913 wreaked havoc upon the dam, the adjoining railroad, and the canal during one week beginning March 31st. Finally, the city of Akron built a reservoir north of Kent, which resulted in controversy and turmoil at the time, and still presents issues for Kent today.

Mr. Enders previously covered the period from 1669-1900 in Kent. He continues to speak throughout the county and has become an accomplished story teller and entertaining guest. The Universalist Church offers a unique setting for the program and traces its history back to the Haymaker family, early pioneers in Kent.

Refreshments and an opportunity to take part in a tour of the historic church building will be available.

Our Commissioned Lay Leader

As many of you may recall, my commissioning ceremony as a Commissioned Lay Leader (CLL) took place October 2008, following the completion of a two-year educational program. I would like to provide you with a summary of my responsibilities as a CLL.

I have a three-year agreement with the church Board that stipulates several areas of responsibility, most of which involve different aspects of worship. Some of my worship activities include serving as Chair of the Sunday Program Committee, membership on the Chalice Group Planning Committee, serving as a Worship Associate, and helping Melissa with her sermon writing class. My role in leading Sunday worship services was expanded by the Board last year, requiring me to provide two to four worship services per year. In addition, I am to have a worship service prepared at all times so that I can step in and lead Sunday morning worship should an emergency arise that prevents the worship leader from conducting the service. Other duties include servicing as a referral source for Melissa for the performance of weddings when Melissa is unable to handle them and serving as a back-up for pastoral care needs when Melissa is away.

Although I have an agreement with the Board, they have designated the Committee on Ministry as the entity to whom I am accountable. I meet with the COM quarterly and I report to the OMD District's CLL Panel twice a year. In addition, I work closely with Melissa, who generously shares her wisdom and insights with me. Although I am not a paid staff member, I recently worked with Hal Walker, Karen Lapidus and Melissa to create a shared behavioral covenant. I am pleased and proud to be part of the team of caring, competent and dedicated individuals who serve this church.

I will share more information about my specific CLL activities in future newsletters.
