've been trying to remember what I thought was a lyric. Thanks to Google, I found the phrase I was looking for only to be reminded that it comes not from a song, but a poem. This is the last stanza of Marge Piercy's poem "The Art of Blessing the Day"

Attention is love, what we must give children, mothers, fathers, pets, our friends, the news, the woes of others. What we want to change we curse and then pick up a tool. Bless whatever you can with eyes and hands and tongue. If you can't bless it, get ready to make it new.

The rest of the poem speaks of blessings; blessings like rain after drought, like sun after rain, like the blessing of the ripe peach or perfect tomato. The poet writes of blessings like political victories or the return of a favorite cat or a friend or love. She reminds us of the art of blessing, the way it requires our attention, the way we have to notice if we are going to bless. And then, at the end, she comes to the truth we know all too well. There are things we cannot bless. You can surely construct your own list as easily as I can make mine. In addition to our personal litanies, the news too often seems a daily reporting of all which cannot be blessed or affirmed or celebrated.

The opposite of blessing is cursing, but what good does cursing do? It might make us feel better for a few moments, but then what? After the warmth of that righteous feeling fades, is there anything left? The poet suggests that what is left is the opportunity to create change. "If you can't bless it, get ready to make it new."

Supporting Youth as they Transition from Childhood to Young Adulthood

The passage from childhood to young adulthood is one of the most significant transitions of our lives. Everything changes! Teens have more privileges, but with those

Rituals are built into every session. They allow the experiences to be embodied. For example, at the Opening Ceremony for the youth and their parents,

privileges come more responsibilities. Teens are thinking in a different way. Instead of having mostly a concrete point of view, teens now think in the abstract and have the growing ability to consider a paradox.

One of the developmental tasks of youth is to discern and articulate what is important to them. Our Coming of Age program for ninth and tenth graders



takes advantage of this special moment in time to guide our youth through this passage while supporting them as Unitarian Universalists.

The curriculum that we are using, Coming of Age: Deepening Ties Within Your Congregation, employs four essential elements; Mentored learning, testing, ritual and celebration. This same model, with differing underlying philosophies, is employed in initiation rites from many religious traditions including Judaism and Catholicism, to name just two.

Our mentored learning piece relates to both the explorations that the youth will be undertaking with the four facilitators as well as with their mentors. In the classroom setting, the facilitators and youth will engage in topics such as values, faith, God, service to others and evil. They will partner with their mentors to dig deeply into these and other topics to determine what they, as individuals believe.

There will be many opportunities for testing throughout the program. During the Wilderness Journey Retreat the test is to be alone outside for a period of time. The primary test of the program is the writing of their statements of faith. These personal reflections, which will be created over the course of the program, will be presented to the congregation at the Coming of Age worship service in May.

where the youth and their parents held the ends of a length of ribbon. As they all expressed their gratitude for each other saying, "I thank you for my childhood" and "I thank you for being my child", the ribbon held between them was cut to symbolize that the Coming of Age journey had begun.

The fourth element, celebration, involves the entire congregation. In the spring we will celebrate

their accomplishments and honor their achievements. Then it will be our responsibility to see our youth in a new light and to recognize this important life passage of Coming of Age.

Support for Kent Community Bill of Rights

The UUCK Social Justice Council has approved a resolution supporting ISSUE 21 which allows residents to stop hydraulic fracturing (fracking) and injection wells in the City of Kent. Furthermore, we call for a congregational vote in support of this resolution, taking a position supporting Issue 21: Kent Charter Amendment (Community Bill of Rights). Informational sessions will be held Sunday, September 28th, during both services, in the church Annex. The vote will be between services on **October 12th,** in the Sanctuary, in which a quorum and super-majority will be required for passage. WHEREAS, Unitarian Universalist congregations covenant by our Second and Seventh Principles to affirm and promote justice, equity, and compassion in human relations and respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part; and

WHEREAS, the climate crisis threatens Earth systems through warming, destabilization of the atmosphere and climate, sea level rise, and the acidification of the oceans, of which the brunt of the burden has fallen and will fall on the poorest people in the world, who are least responsible for the crisis; and WHEREAS, the 2006 Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) General Assembly approved a Statement of Conscience on the Threat of Global Warming/Climate Change declaring "that we will not acquiesce to the ongoing degradation and destruction of life that human actions are leaving to our children and grandchildren"; and

WHEREAS, we have a moral responsibility to Earth, to all beings, and to future generations to do everything in our power to bring about a swift transition from fossil fuels to a sustainable energy economy; and

WHEREAS, a significant body of evidence has emerged to demonstrate that hydraulic fracturing and injection wells are inherently dangerous to people and their communities. Risks include adverse impacts on water, air, agriculture, public health and safety, property values, climate stability and economic vitality; and

WHEREAS, the Community Bill of Rights will allow residents to prevent the extraction of hydrocarbons and the drilling of injection wells within Kent and will assert individual rights over those of corporations;

WHEREAS, the Unitarian Universalist Church of Kent required a super-majority passage of 85% congregational approval in order to speak with one voice in support of this resolution.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Unitarian Universalist Church of Kent supports the passage of Issue 21: Kent Charter Amendment (Community Bill of Rights) on November 4th, 2014.


