

Finding the Balance

We are in the crazy time, when the messages from our culture are saying "More, More – Get Busy" and our earth rhythm whispers "Slow Down – Settle In". It is OK to step away sometimes from our human constructed hectic pace to take a walk, reconnect with a friend or even slow cook a meal.

In faith communities we face similar dilemmas. A framework I have found useful is to recall the six distinct components to balanced programming in youth and children's religious education:

- Worship a time when we come together to affirm what is worthwhile and important.
- Learning the continual process of asking questions, considering new ideas and sorting out what is relevant to our situation.
- Leadership young and old we all are capable of leadership, be it in lighting the chalice, or in sharing our talents.
- Fellowship closely related to Fun and Food, an acknowledgement that it is good to be together!
- Social Action whether the focus is as local as cleaning our church or as global as climate change and human rights, we are all called to do something to make the world a better place.
- Intergenerational Connections in a world that is so segregated by age, faith communities are one of the few places where multiple generations can interact and get to know each other.

This year the Religious Education Committee is viewing all of its activities with a multigenerational focus. I would love to hear your ideas about how we can intentionally welcome into participation persons of different generations into ALL the activities of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Kent!

In case you were not in church on November 22, the letter shared in the order of service is included on page 8 of this newsletter. Since it was written, we have received a few more pledges toward our capital campaign. We cannot thank you enough for your generous support of this once-in-a-generation endeavor. In addition to all the financial support, over 90 people have helped support the campaign with their personal efforts. That level of participation is a testament to our shared commitment to live into our vision!



You may remember that the Capital Campaign Team made several naming opportunities available as a part of this campaign. Previously we have announced that the new social hall will be named the Olive and Clinton Hobbs Hall and that the education and library wing of the new building will be named in memory of Dr. Gordon Vars, as designated by Rev. Renee and Randy Ruchotzke. On November 22 we shared four additional naming opportunities selected by members and friends and approved by our Board of Trustees. One of the new Religious Education classrooms will be named in honor of Rebecca Haines as designated by Brad Bolton

and Rev. Christie Anderson. The new library and meeting room will be named in memory of Bret Orsburn as designated by Heidi Shaffer and Kathy and Kevin Kerns. The walkway connecting the church and the new building will be named in memory of Heidrun Hultgren as designated by Dave and Diana Watt. And the gardens around the new building will be named by Mary Lou Holly. Mary Lou plans to honor the memory of her mother and her brother, but she wants to allow the project to unfold before choosing a permanent name. For now she has chosen as a placeholder name The Peaceable Kingdom Gardens.

We are very grateful to each of these donors for honoring another with these gifts. And we are grateful to each and every donor for their support in turning our dreams into reality.

Dear Members and Friends,

We are pleased to announce the results of our Capital campaign, *Realizing the Vision: Not for us Alone*. We embarked on this campaign to work toward our vision of creating new and better space for the church. Expanded space will provide us the room we need for current programming as well as open up new ways we can live out our church mission. The campaign was to raise funds for our proposed 3-phase project: Phase 1, construct a new building to hold a larger social hall, new kitchen, library, and 2 new RE rooms; Phase 2, renovate the basement of Fessenden for RE space; Phase 3, renovate the sanctuary.

We are very pleased and happy to announce that, as of this week, we have raised over \$850,000 in donations and pledges to the campaign. These funds are in addition to money raised a few years ago that was used to purchase property for expansion. The new funds will allow us to complete Phase 1, and any money left over once that is completed will be put toward Phase 2. Raising these funds is an enormous accomplishment for our congregation of 200 members, and the new 5,000+ square foot building will greatly enhance space for church activities. We thank the congregation for their tremendous support, in both time (over 90 people have donated their time to the campaign) and treasure (over 115 pledges received). We are extremely grateful for the congregation's involvement and support.

As we move forward, there is more to do. The Building Expansion Team (BET) is working out details for the new building, with the stretch goal of having the groundbreaking in late Spring 2016. The BET will be in touch with the congregation as they proceed. Members and friends will be paying their pledges over the coming 3 years. And some members have plans to do additional fundraisers specifically for the Capital Campaign (contact Marion Yeagler and Kathy Kerns if you want to organize a fundraiser).

Please note that we have been working with projected costs for the project. Although we have projected the cost of Phase 1 as \$750,000 - 790,000, exact costs will not be known for some time. The BET has the difficult task of balancing requests for specific building features with cost containment. Appreciate that the more we spend on Phase 1, the less we have available for Phase 2 (costs for that could be \$150,000 - 200,000). We would like to remind everyone that the BET has been responsive to requests from the congregation, and ask for your patience and understanding as we finalize the new building. While there will be continual dialogue with the congregation, and efforts to accommodate requests where feasible, the BET is also charged with wise use of resources. Let's lighten their load by showing our faith in them and our gratitude for the challenging task they have undertaken for the congregation. Working together, we can build a new space that will make all of us proud.

Thank you everyone for your support! It has been our pleasure to work with the other members of the Capital Campaign team— Kay Eckman, Dave Smeltzer, Randy Leeson, and Melissa Carvill-Ziemer— to make this project happen for our church.

TransAtlantic by Colum McCann

The Patricia Pownall UU Book Group will be meeting on Tuesday, December 8 at 7 pm in the home of Bonnie Harper. This month we are reading *TransAtlantic: A Novel* by Colum McCann.

Newfoundland, 1919. Two aviators—Jack Alcock and Arthur Brown—set course for Ireland as they attempt the first nonstop flight across the Atlantic Ocean, placing their trust in a modified bomber to heal the wounds of the Great War.

Dublin, 1845 and '46. On an international lecture tour in support

of his subversive autobiography, Frederick Douglass finds the Irish people sympathetic to the abolitionist cause—despite the fact that, as famine ravages the countryside, the poor suffer from hardships that are astonishing even to an American slave.

TransAtlantic

New York, 1998. Leaving behind a young wife and newborn child, Senator George Mitchell departs for Belfast, where it has fallen to him, the son of an Irish-American father and a Lebanese mother, to shepherd Northern Ireland's notoriously bitter and volatile peace talks to an uncertain conclusion.

These three iconic crossings are connected by a series of remarkable women whose personal stories are caught up in the swells of history. Beginning with Irish housemaid Lily Duggan, who crosses paths with Frederick Douglass, the novel follows her daughter and granddaughter, Emily and Lottie, and culminates in the present-day story of Hannah Carson, in whom all the hopes and failures of previous generations live on. From the loughs of Ireland to the flatlands of Missouri and the windswept coast of Newfoundland, their journeys mirror the progress and shape of history. They each learn that even the most unassuming moments of grace have a way of rippling through time, space, and memory.

The labels— Christian, Jew, Muslim, Buddhist, Hindu, theist and non-theist—no longer define who or what we love, or how spirit moves in our lives.

create a new vision of faith that no
longer divides us, but connects us to an
interdependent future that works for all.
