Immediate Action: Stop HB 680 That Makes Voting Harder

In this time of anguish, lawmakers shouldn't be making it harder for all voices to be heard.

We are calling for simple and safe voting this November and HB 680 doesn't deliver on that. The Ohio House of Representatives is fast-tracking HB 680 and could pass this bill as early as June 3 or 4.

HB 680 would make it harder to vote by:

Eliminating the last weekend of early voting

Sending an informational postcard rather than a ballot application to voters, and

Threatening the safety and security of election day by requiring any emergency plans to be established almost two months in advance.

Call lawmakers today and tell them: roadblocks to voting have no place in our democracy!

Support Ohio Immigrant Families

The Cbus Immigrant Transit Assistance group (the bus greeters) and Simakovsky Law and UUJO have been working together on ways we can respond to the virus crisis in Central Ohio, knowing that certain marginalized populations are being hit much harder than others.

We are most concerned about the immigrant families, knowing that many of them work in hospitality and food service. And because of various status issues, they won't have any access to the public benefits or basic support networks that State of Ohio and the U.S. Congress have created.

The need is great and growing. Our first service day served 75 families. Our next service day fed 500 families (picture above). We anticipate 1000 at our next service day.

To meet this need, Simakovsky Law offices in downtown Columbus will be collecting non-perishable food donations and UUJO will be facilitating online financial donations aimed at serving the undocumented population in Central Ohio.

Physical donations can be dropped off Monday to Friday from 9am to 5pm at Simakovsky Law 460 E Main St Columbus, Ohio 43215. There will be a donation box right outside of our door (inside the building). Requested supplies include:

beans, rice, canned items, corn tortillas or masa harina, diapers, baby formula, potatoes, pasta, bread,
 Maria cookies,instant coffee, paper products, like toilet paper

Monetary donations will be used to purchase wholesale supplies on the list and other necessary items as needs rise.


